Comparative Studies in Race and Ethnicity (CSRE) students explore how race and ethnicity shape global history and influence every aspect of our lives. You may focus on a specific race or ethnicity or compare the histories and experiences of different groups through a lens such as health, gender, technology, the arts, or politics.
